Henry Mandelsberg, 83, of Bluff City, TN, passed away on Thursday, June 9, 2016 at the Cambridge House in Bristol, TN. Mr. Mandelsberg was born on January 25, 1933 in Berlin, Germany to the late Max and Adele Feuerstein Mandelsberg. He is also preceded in death by a brother, Leo Mandelsberg.

Henry moved from Berlin, Germany to Havana, Cuba prior to the start of World War II. He and the family eventually settled in southern California. He was a veteran of the US Navy where he was a journalist. He was a property and casualty insurance underwriter, an insurance broker, and insurance agency executive vice president before retiring to Bluff City, Tn in 1990. He was a member of the Naval USS Hancock CV/CVA19 Association and former member of the Bristol B'nai Sholom Congregation where he served as treasurer.

He is survived by his wife, Ellen Reinking Mandelsberg; daughter, Rachel Kitada and husband Michael of Placentia, CA; sons, Daniel Mandelsberg and wife Judith of Corpus Christie, TX and Steven Mandelsberg and wife Regina of Bluff City, TN; eleven grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Graveside services will be held at 11:30 AM on Wednesday, June 15, 2016 at Mountain Home National Cemetery in Mountain Home, TN. Rabbi Arther Rutberg will be officiating.
